wood sale of extras. Quote from David: "This is a working woodshop, not a home, so plan to get dirty and dusty." No callaheads, just show up. Directions: From Denver: Take 36 north to Foothills Parkway (hwy 157, CU stadium). North on Foothills through the next 3 lights and exit at Pearl street. From the right lane of the Pearl St offramp, cross all lanes of traffic immediately and take a left in front of Boulder Toyota onto 47th St. You will see Boulder Toyota right across the street from you as you sit at the bottom of the offramp. The shop is about 1 1/2 blocks up on the right, a cream colored, single story, cinderblock building with dark blue doors. The building runs east/west, and our space is the second from the west end. There's also a "Woodturning" sign on the marquee on 47th St. The address is 2756 - 47th St, and the number is above the door. If you get that far, it should be obvious! From Ft Collins: Take I-25 south to the "hwy 52" exit, and go west to the hwy dead ends into IBM at the Longmont Diagonal (or take 287 to the Diagonal). Turn SW on the Diagonal (a left from hwy52), and then take the left fork in the highway where it says "Foothills Parkway". At the next light, Valmont, go left and make an immediate right onto 47th St. The shop is about 1/2 block down, on the left. Follow the description above for identification of the building, etc.

Tips and Techniques


Grain is Everything

Wood is a natural substance. It is formed of long, stiff cells that hold their shape even after most moisture is removed (vs. say, a tomato, which doesn't – but we won't go into that here). The direction in which the cells lay flat is called "grain." If you work with the grain, you can get nearly glass-smooth cuts. If you work against the grain, you can use the wood as a lint brush.

By cutting with the grain, each cell wall is supported in the direction of the cut. By cutting against the grain, the cell walls are not supported in the direction of the cut, and thus will fray and tear, leaving a rough surface. If you've ever rubbed a cat's fur the wrong way, you will see the same effect.


Cutting with the grain is often called "cutting downhill." Cutting against the grain is often called "cutting uphill."


Depending on how you mount the wood on the lathe, the grain will typically be oriented a certain way. For example, if you mount a blank for a typical bowl, the grain is perpendicular to the axis of spinning – it is not lined up with the spin. (The following pictures show the grain as it would be mounted on the lathe.)



Thus, you would want to cut from the rim to the center to cut downhill with the grain. If you cut from the center to the rim, you would be cutting uphill and would have a rough cut.


Contrarywise, if you mounted the blank so that the grain was parallel to the spin, the directions are reversed. This mounting method is common for small lidded boxes.





In this case, cutting downhill means cutting from the center to the rim. Uphill cutting is from the rim to the center.

Finally, if you were turning the outside of a blank whose grain is parallel to the spin ("spindle turning"), you would have to constantly think about which direction is downhill.



Basically, if you are cutting from larger to smaller diameter (towards the center of the spindle blank), you are cutting downhill. If you are cutting from the smaller to the larger diameter (towards the outside of the spindle blank), you are cutting uphill.


Now, of course, you will encounter grain that isn't perfectly straight and parallel, such as in burls, birds-eye maple, and so on. That's the wood that many turners like, because it has so much figure and character. In that case, you pick the most common grain direction, keep your tools very sharp, and take very light cuts to help prevent catches.

If you stop, look at how the wood grain is oriented, and think about how the grain is supported (or not), you will see what direction to cut to get that glass-smooth surface we all envy.

What is Riding the Bevel?

Sounds like a new summer surf movie, but it's not. "Riding the bevel" means to approach the wood so that the bevel of your tool (such as a gouge) touches the wood first. Then, you carefully roll your tool until the edge engages

the wood. This technique helps to prevent nasty catches caused by approaching with the edge first.
