
She lives in Clearfield, Utah with her husband, six children, four dogs, one cat, and three lathes. She still puts just as much heart and soul into her projects as the day she gave that special first rattle that started it all, to her son.

The Demo:

Join Emily as she walks you step-by-step through the process of turning spinning tops and captive ring baby rattles. Learn proper spindle tool presentation and tool techniques while learning some easy and simple projects that are great warm-ups for a day at the lathe! Emily begins the demo with a walk-through of tool selections, then moves onto proper spindle turning techniques that will bring ease and comfort when turning beads and coves. "If you can turn a bead and a cove you can turn anything!"

The first project will be a quick and simple spinning top. Emily turns these for wholesale orders and often sells 7,000+ a year. Learning efficient tool movements makes this a super-quick project that will bring delight to children of all ages.

After you are comfortable with the top-turning concepts and techniques, you will move on to turning a captive ring baby rattle. Emily will teach design, layout, and the safety protocols necessary for you and for the child using it. Emily's ultimate goal is to have you learn the toolwork and body movements required to get a nice round captive ring every time. Proper sanding and finishing techniques will also be discussed.

Larry Hughes hosted a great LOTL class on segmented turning on June 15th at his shop. One is never old when there are glue and wooden puzzle parts to play with. We learned of segmented turning techniques, miter saw jigs and angle finders for precise wood wedges, sanding segmented rings using large sanding disks that are faceplate mounted on the lathe, and more. Larry gifted us his knowledge as well as candy and hot air balloon kits.











On July 2nd, **Don Prorak** will show us how to turn threecornered bowls, which could also be tea light holders. The more adventurous could try the double tri-corner.

The August LOTL did not have enough signups to hold a class, and the Sept. LOTL would have been the day after Labor Day. The second Saturday or Sunday in October is planned for a LOTL picnic; more on that later. The last LOTL class in 2024 will be the afternoons of Nov. 5th and 6th at Rockler; Raleigh Lockhart will teach Shaker Boxes.

Starbond is our CA glue supplier. Our minimum order is \$100, but we receive an additional discount at \$200, making shipping free. Sign up for Starbond's newsletter to be notified of sales that beat our wholesale prices.

Craft Supplies - send orders to Ted Mellin Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply - send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Rick Orr gave a great demo on turning antlers for our June Brown Bag Demo. He told us where to obtain elk antler, current elk antler prices and how to choose prime antler pieces for turning. Rick brought several finished turned antler projects to show, as well as a very large raw elk antler beam to indicate the prime antler location(s) for turning.

He demonstrated turning techniques and how he turns an antler box. He showed several options using Corian or wood for the top and bottom.

We need volunteers to help in several areas—set up, food prep and clean up.





Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.



made this 7x10" lidded box of Schacht laminated maple/walnut, walnut, and myrtle. The finish is Danish oil and Minwax floor wax (so she can walk on it?). Dave Hawley constructed the original laminated bowl blank; Debra segmented the blank into the body and lid, and then found a compatible laminate for the finial.

She also made this 11x5" hot air balloon from pieces Larry Hughes gave us from his LOTL segmented turning class. The trapezoids are mainly yellow heart, padauk, maple, beetle kill pine, and walnut. The basket is sapele. The finish is shellac followed by spray-on poly. Some of the assembly/ turning steps are at: https://www.facebook.com/profile.php?id=100057331244918







Gordon Dalby made these 7 1/2" tall by 5" diameter pieces of cherry, figured maple, shedua, dved black veneer, and walnut.





Curt Vogt was able to do a little turning this past month while trying to work on the vegetable garden took up lots of time. He set up a Facetime call with a friend who was looking for inspiration on box turning and he made this one to show the process. The box is made from maple with an inset piece of walnut on top of the lid. He included a slight taper shape towards the top and a gentle groove

on the lid to use when opening. It was finished with a few coats of lacquer and the shine knocked back with a very light hand sanding. The final finish detail was a hand buffing with Renaissance Wax that still kept the satin look and feel. The inside lid and box bottom are decorated, and the bottom inscribed with the box details and the presentation date as it was a wedding present for a friend.

Curt also wanted to express his thanks to the FRW for the efforts in posting some of the past meeting demos on YouTube. Especially the recently added ones featuring Pete Holtus. He has found them to be great inspiration and they have held a flood of memories of how skilled and helpful Pete's instruction was.



Here are some platters that **Scott DeWeese** finished this month. All are about 17" silver maple platters with pyrography, India Ink and spray lacquer finish.





Henry Williams made this off-center platter. Made of cherry, it's 15" in diameter by 2" high, textured with pyrography. He did a FRW club demo on this April 2011. The club library has a dvd and the website
