Elizabeth is a woodturning instructor who lives in Seattle, WA. She began woodworking in 2015, and some of her first creations included several pieces of furniture in the Arts & Crafts style. She eventually turned to smaller objects and now specializes in bowls, spoons, and boxes. Her skills range from natural finish and simple forms to highly carved and painted forms that emulate natural motifs.



Elizabeth serves as club president for her local woodturning club, the Seattle Woodturners, and she helps run the local spoon club chapter, the Seattle Spoon Club. She was awarded the American Association of Woodturner's 2023 Professional Outreach Program's Artist Showcase and demonstrated at the 2023 AAW Louisville Symposium.

The topic for Elizabeth's presentation will be Carving a Wave/Leaf Motif onto Turned Pieces. She will discuss the story behind the piece and how to look at nature abstractly for inspiration. She will talk about the tools, tips, and tricks for creating the wave/leaf motifs on your turned objects. This consists of layout, and ways to highlight the wood or add additional

textures to the piece through the use of rotary carvers, woodburners, and hand tools. We'll explore various


AAW MEMBERSHIP



Industrial Abrasives - send orders to Jay Miller Industrial Abrasives is our principal vendor for sanding supplies. Prices for hook & loop mandrels and discs remain the lowest in the marketplace and their backing is a heavier weight than the competition.

Starbond - send orders to Jay Miller

Starbond is our CA glue supplier. Our minimum order is \$100, but we receive an additional discount at \$200, making shipping free. Sign up for Starbond's newsletter to be notified of sales that beat our wholesale prices.

Craft Supplies - send orders to Ted Mellin Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply - send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.


Individual Catalog Orders

One of the projects discussed was a hot air balloon and Matt recently fnished his version. He had built a wedge sled for his table saw just before attending the class but hadn't yet turned anything segmented. With inspiration and knowledge from the class, he's very proud of the final product.







Ken Rollins has been making some 5" bowls from wood rescued from a firewood pile in Wisconsin. So far he has turned three of walnut and two from birch. He's still applying coats of Danish oil to get them slightly glossy. He has two more birch blanks to turn and he'll be returning to Wisconsin in September to look for bigger logs.



Raleigh Lockhart made this 7.5" cherry bowl. He decorated the rim with a pyrography tree, And of course, he made the apples as well.





Cathie McLean's niece crushed a golf shot that snapped the head off Cathie's dad's club. So she memorialized it by turning it into a beer tap handle for his kegerator. Before that, she made a little more traditional handle to practice on and colored it with alcohol ink.



Debra Higley Feldman turned a double tricornered bowl after Don Prorak's LOTL class. Made of ash, it's finished with tung oil and acrylic/mica/lacquer. The carved image is the underside before she added a final color. She also turned a 9" bowl of cracked, punky, spalted madrone with a bad attitude. It has a walnut base and was

finished with tung oil.







Larry Fox turned three bowls this month. Two were of Hawaiian koa, with diameters of 10" and 11". The other was Norfolk Island Pine with a 13" diameter.







Curt Vogt did not do too much turning this month but was excited to get a new jaw set for his Teknatool / Nova chucks. The Nova 6091 Dome Jaw Set was just recently introduced and nicely checked-off a wish-list item for Curt. As he describes it "Perfect for foolish / crazy people who like to turn things that can be measured against toothpicks."

He promptly put the jaws on one of his Nova G3s and turned a skinny icicle ornament with a captured ring. Pictured are the icicle in progress in the new jaw set and then the completed project.
