Kevin Jesequel is a woodturner living in Portland,

Oregon. Taking an interest in hollow forms after the passing of his mother in 2020, he has quickly become recognized as one of the top hollow form artists today. His work has been published several times in *American Woodturner* and he has been a juried and invited artist to numerous exhibitions. He was selected



by the American Association of Woodturner's POP Committee to receive the 2024 Artist Showcase at their annual symposium and enjoys demonstrating and teaching at clubs across the country. He is an active member of two local woodturning clubs and served as president of Cascade Woodturner's Association in 2024.

For our demo, Kevin will discuss making a hollow form with a fingertip opening. Do you have a desire to create hollow forms on the lathe? Spence Industrial Supply - send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

2025 PHEOG

It's getting closer to the March 15th deadline for PHEOG, time to get your applications submitted!

The Pete Holtus Educational Opportunity Grant program provides grant money to members through an application process to further your woodturning education. Examples include attending a symposium or workshop; enabling a special project. Those awarded with grants must complete a return benefit to the club no later than one year from the grant award. Examples include giving a demo=at a club meeting, brown bag, mentorship session=writing an article, teaching a HOW/LOTL class. School grants are also available.

See complete rules and application on the FRW website (https://www.frontrangewoodturners.org/) located in the "Education" tab under "PHEOG" subheading.

Some brief details:

- There are no age restrictions but you must be a member in good standing for a minimum of 1 year before applying.
- Individual maximum award amount is \$1250 (\$1500 for School grants).
- A grant may not be awarded more than once every three years. For example, if you received a grant in 2020 you are not eligible again until 2023 (skip 2021, 2022).
- Applications for a grant are due by March 15th.

Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.

Roberto Ferrer Classes - by Don Prorak

Our February demonstrator, Roberto Ferrer, taught two hands-on classes, both of which I had the good fortune to attend. The first, entitled "Milk Paint & Shavings", involved turning a small bowl, then embellishing it with carving and milk paint. Roberto had a lot of great tips on basic bowl turning and sharpening. The carving was done with Foredom, Dremel, and micromotor tools before adding milk paint. I personally have not been all that excited about milk

paint, but Roberto has inspired me to give it a chance and explore further. Here is my completed project.

The second class was "Antiquity", a fluted bowl from his demonstration. Again we turned a bowl, this time with a wide rim employing the undercut technique he





demonstrated. We then used an indexing wheel and laser to lay out the facets, and began carving. The carving was more extensive, so we did not complete the project in the class, but here is my bowl, still in progress.

I also attended his RMWT demo, where he showed his rose engine inspired jig for creating his unique wall scuptures. I'll probably never do that, but it was fascinating.

I was particularly impressed with Roberto's extra attention to the less experienced turners, and accommodating all skill levels. He is an incredible artist, and I hope we'll have him back in the future.



Carl Fulbright made this 3D elusion segmented bowl using walnut, ash and maple wood. Measuring 9" x 7", he finished it on the lathe with carnauba wax.

Debra Higley Feldman made a few small projects this month. The spinning tops are mostly Schacht hard maple. The screwdriver is pine. Finishes are watercolor pen, acrylic paint, mica, and lacquer.





Gordon Dalby made this 8" diameter x 6" tall segmented bowl from mahogany, maple and red heart. It was his second try at lining up the X design maple and came out better this time. Should make the

critique from the international club be kinder. Gotta keep trying!

Don Prorak took part in a wand-making session at the Pikes Peak club, but made a conductor's baton instead!



Henry Williams made this 2-3/4" x 4-1/4" pillar candle stand of claro walnut with chameleon flake gilding. It was inspired by Cindy Drozda's recent Gilded Sphere Box IRD, and Emma Cook's (The Tiny Turner) chameleon flakes YouTube video.

The effort paid off with some nice boxes of differing shapes and styles shown in the photos both closed and open. All of them have embellishments on the bottom and under the lid and all but one were finished with wipe-on poly.



However, only one box turned out the way he wanted with a contrasting "adapter ring" between the box body and lid out of the three attempted. The one is shown individually and is claro walnut and maple. The others worked out to be good exercises in fixing Curt's "design opportunities."

He also completed assembly of three magic wands of various woods. It was a very productive month indeed as the dust and chips had

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to be emptied from the collectors twice!
